# A Parliamentary Moment

## April 2006

### Privileged Motions

This is one of the categories of motions that were outlined last month. Privileged motions constitute an exception to the rule that all debate must relate to the pending motion or business. This is because such motions stem from special matters of overriding importance and are allowed immediate action.

1. **Call for the Orders of the Day:** The term ‘Orders of the Day’ refers to the meeting agenda. When a member finds that the meeting agenda is not being followed, s/he may, if it is timely, even interrupt a speaker and “Call for the Orders of the Day.” It does not require a second, is neither debatable nor amendable, and must be enforced unless negated by a two-thirds vote of the members.
2. **Raise a Question of Privilege:** Questions of Privilege relate either to the assembly as a whole or to the individual, and the individual must indicate to which s/he is rising with the question of privilege. The interruption may relate to any number of circumstances such as the ventilation, noise, conduct of a person, propriety of an action, etc. Depending upon the nature of the issue, the chair may dispose of it or may require a motion to be made.
3. **Recess:** A privileged motion to recess (a short intermission) may occur when there is a pending motion or business but not when someone else has the floor. It must be seconded, is not debatable, can be amended regarding its duration, requires a majority vote, and cannot be reconsidered. A motion to adjourn or one to fix a time for adjournment will have precedence over a motion to recess. When there is no pending motion or business, a motion to recess is then a main motion.
4. **Adjourn:** Only a motion to fix the time to adjourn takes precedence over the privileged motion to adjourn. There may be times when this motion is not in order such as when voting is in process or when another member has the floor. It must be seconded, is neither amendable nor debatable, requires a majority vote, and cannot be reconsidered. There are so many conditions regarding adjournment that a single parliamentary moment could be used to present them. Anyhow, a meeting is not over until the fat lady sings, that is, the chair declares, “The meeting is adjourned.”
5. **Fix the Time to Which to Adjourn:** A pending motion or business may be interrupted by a motion to set a time for adjournment. It is out of order if someone has the floor, must be seconded, is not debatable, may be amended, requires a majority vote, and can be reconsidered.
